The Poetry of Everyday Life: William Carlos Williams' "This Is Just To Say"

William Carlos Williams (1883-1963) is one of the most important modernist poets in America, primarily because he focused on American subjects for his writing. Unlike many of the other American modernists such as Ezra Pound, Amy Lowell and T.S. Eliot, Williams did not leave America. He was born, lived, and died in the small-town of New Rutherford, New Jersey, and continued to practice medicine while he was a professional poet. Thus his poems reflect the everyday experience of ordinary people. A good example is "This Is Just To Say," published in 1934. Actually, this poem doesn't seem like a poem at all. It resembles an ordinary note that a husband or wife might leave or which a child might write to his parent. This "found poem" makes us curious about the relationship between the speaker and the person to whom the note is addressed, but more generally it forces us to think about the significance of everyday objects and situations as subjects for poetry.

"This Just to Say" is a 12 line poem. It is divided into three stanzas. There is no regular pattern of stresses in the lines or pattern of rhyme. The poem consist of 2 or maybe 3 sentences but there is no punctuation in the poem. As mentioned before the "poem" is written in simple everyday language as a note to a loved one, the kind of note that would be put on the door of a refrigerator. In fact, the plums were in the icebox (1. 4) and are cold (1. 12), so this note was likely left on the refrigerator door just after the plums were eaten. There are no figures of speech in the poem, and only the last three lines of the poem--"they were

- 1. Introduce the poet and select relevant details about his/her life.

delicious / so sweet / and so cold"--have any special poetic characteristics: a repetition of the adverb "so" and the alliteration of "so sweet" and consonance of "delicious." All of these sounds seem to express the speaker's enjoyment of the sweet, juicy plums.

A critical view can help support your reading of the poem.

Write the author's last name or the name of the web-site as a reference.

The title of the poem, which is really part of the note is a typical expression for starting a note by emphasizing the note's simple message and perhaps the haste in which the note was written. 'This is just to say' means, in other words, this is just a simple, quick note to tell you something. But the idea of giving a simple message is somewhat ironic in the sense that such everyday notes or conversations are never so simple. People's everyday communication, especially between husband and wife and parents and children, is always full of other meanings that express their relationship. This poem is no exception. That said, the poem is also quite unclear on many points. Stephen Matterson says that the poem gives "the reader a wide range of possibilities." In fact, the meaning of the poem is so open that the "reader is left free to construct a poem, and the reader becomes the owner of the resulting poem" (Matterson). Indeed, the speaker of the poem is not identified. Is it a man or woman? A husband or wife? The situation is in the home, so possibly it is a message from husband to wife. The speaker could also be a child or young adult, but the voice seems more mature than that of a child or teenager. Even though it is had been suggested that the speaker of the poem is a boy (Matterson), I want to discuss the poem as a message between husband and wife and an expression of their relationship.

In the first stanza the speaker announces that he has eaten the plums in the icebox. In the second stanza, he says he knows that his wife was probably saving them for breakfast. And finally, in the third stanza, he says that he is sorry but the plums were delicious.

Explain the situation in the poem.

Summarize the contents of the poem by stanza.

The note is an apology that the husband has written after eating

the plums. Maybe he has written the note late at night when he was hungry

or when he came home late from work. Maybe he woke early in morning

Forgive me
they were delicious 10
so sweet
and so cold

and ate them before his wife got up, knowing she was planning to eat them. In any case, he has left the note on the fridge and is gone. He is not there to apologize in person, and maybe he can't or doesn't want to because his wife will get angry. The last stanza is interesting because the apology seems very serious. "Forgive me" (1. 9) seems to be too strong for the simple act of eating a few plums. Is there more to apologize for? Also, the stanza is

serious. "Forgive me" (1. 9) seems to be too strong for the simple act of eating a few plums. Is there more to apologize for? Also, the stanza is ambiguous in other ways. Probably he is asking to be forgiven for eating the plums, but the fact that they were delicious is not a reason to excuse the fact that he took them. As mentioned, there is no punctuation so we are free to connect the apology to the sentence that follows. The message suggests that he is sorry for being tempted to eat the plums and for enjoying them. He has eaten them and now she can't enjoy them. Why didn't they share them

together? The image of the plums and the temptation to eat the plums can

have a sexual connotation. Therefore, the poem may express the husband's

changing feelings of sexual attraction and love for his wife. He says the

plums are delicious and sweet but they are also cold. Does he mean that

Think about the situation and ask questions. their relationship is cold? Do he still love her? Perhaps he has been tempted by another woman or maybe he is having an affair with another woman. In any case, it seems that he does not love his wife anymore, and they do not enjoy the intimacy of sex anymore. Thus, "This is Just to Say" is a poem about a husband's possible infidelity or the loss of love and intimacy in a marriage.

Restate the main ida of the essay.

In "This is Just to Say," William Carlos Williams suggests the changing relation between husband and wife through a simple note of apology. Many of the modernist poets tried to represent everyday life of ordinary people in simple language. Imagism was the beginning of this movement in the early twentieth century, and poets such as Amy Lowell believed their role was to find beauty in the modern world. Williams focused on American themes and is famous for the saying "No ideas but in things" (*Poetry Archive*). "This Is Just to Say" is a good example of this interest in everyday life and Williams' interest in things and the ideas and feelings that they can hold.
