## **Course Description**

This course focuses on American poetry in the 20th century. We will study the different ways that American writers have used poetry to express the experience of modern life. Through lectures and class activities, we will learn how to read, analyze, discuss and write about poetry as well as think about the relationship of the poetry to the society and culture of the times.

## **Course Objectives**

Course objectives include (1) knowledge of American culture and society in the 20th century; (2) ability to read, analyze, discuss and write about poetry; (3) knowledge of the development of American poetry and its relation to the broader culture of the US.

## **Teaching Methods**

Class activities include lectures in English, weekly reading and journal writing, note-taking, small-group discussion and tests. There will be lectures each week, introducing poets, poems and the culture and events of the times. One poem will be assigned each week. You will write a short response (one or more paragraphs) to the poem in your class notebook and use your response for discussions with your classmates. You will also make notes for your group discussions in addition to taking your lecture notes. Your notebook is record of homework and class participation. I will check your class notebook two or more times during the semester.

(1) Class notebook	50%
(2) Tests and quizzes	20%
(3) A short analytical essay on a poem	
(3-5 pages, typed and double-spaced)	30%
